2.1 Course Summary

Note: Some of the topics covered in this course may be confronting for some people. For example topics covered include sexual violence, sex offenders and child abuse. If you do not want to be exposed to these topics then you are advised not to take this course.

This course provides an introduction and broad overview to the discipline of Forensic Psychology. You will be introduced to a wide range of topics in forensic psychology, covering both criminal and civil law. Topics include jury decision making, eyewitness memory, forensic expert evidence, criminal profiling, children and the courts, victims and offenders, mental illness and offending, and the treatment and rehabilitation of offenders. The course will draw on cognitive, social and clinical psychological research. The goal is to demonstrate how psychological research can help us to understand and reform all aspects of the legal process. In addition to providing an introduction to Forensic Psychology, the course may offer a useful foundation for students interested in further study of forensic psychology at the Masters, Doctoral or PhD level.

Some of the topics covered in this course are also introduced in the level 1 course, PSYC1027 Forensic Psychology: Crime, Courts and Corrections. These common topics are covered in greater depth in PSYC3301, and additional topics are introduced. PSYC1027 is not a prerequisite for this course.

2.2 Course Aims

This course aims to provide an introduction and broad overview to the discipline of psychology and law. You will be introduced to a wide range of psychological issues related to aspects of both civil and criminal law. The topics covered will draw on psychological research from various branches of the discipline including cognitive, social, developmental and clinical psychology. The second aim is to encourage an evidence-based approach to the study of topics involving the application of psychological knowledge to legal issues, and to demonstrate how psychological research can help us to understand and reform all aspects of the legal process

2.3 Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

At the successful completion of this course the student should be able to:

1. Apply cognitive, social and clinical psychological theories to a range of legal issues.
2. Critically evaluate and apply psychological research findings to legal or policy problems.
3. Show an advanced understanding of the nature and limitations of applied psychological research.
4. Create reports for legal professionals which summarise relevant psychological research and based on this research provide recommendations to address legal and policy issues.
5. Investigate how psychology can be applied within a correctional environment to assess offenders, develop treatments to reduce offending, and assess intervention efficacy.

3. Strategies and Approaches to Learning

3.1 Learning and Teaching Activities

In 2022 all lectures will be online. The lectures will be broadcast live but will also be recorded.

There are a total of 10 tutorial groups for this course, and all students have been assigned to one of the groups. Students must attend the assigned group. Two of these groups will be held online. All other groups are in person (face-to-face). Attendance is compulsory. The online sessions will not be recorded and students must join the group at the appropriate time and must have their camera turned on.

The design of the structure, content and assessment of this course has been informed by the policy document “Guidelines on learning that inform teaching at UNSW” (see <https://www.teaching.unsw.edu.au/beliefs>). In particular, lectures and lab classes are designed to encourage active, challenging and enjoyable learning which builds on learning that has occurred in other psychology courses and is relevant to the range of students’ likely future careers. The teaching employs a variety of different methods and encourages students to take responsibility for their own learning and to work cooperatively. Use is made of web based materials and assessments have been designed to reflect the learning outcomes and structure of the course.

Each week two, lectures will be used to provide students with an introduction to a broad range of topics within the field of psychology and law. Within these topic areas the lectures will cover current theory, research methods, findings and the application of these findings to the legal process. Some of these topics will be supplemented with additional online modules and resources.

The tutorials are designed to allow opportunities for in-depth and active learning. The sessions will be used to demonstrate and explore some of the issues covered in the lectures and opportunities will be provided to explore the methods used in forensic research, to take part in practical demonstrations, to debate issues and case studies and to participate in role-plays. Tutorials will not be recorded.

To develop students’ critical thinking, they will be asked to monitor media reports for relevant psycho-legal issues and to present to their lab class one such issue along with the empirical research relevant to this topic.

The lectures will draw on topics covered in the textbook and additional readings. You should read the relevant chapter or reading before the lecture so that you start with an understanding of the broad issues. This understanding will provide a conceptual framework and allow you to draw greatest benefit from the lecture. Before each Laboratory class read over your lecture notes (if applicable) and re-read the textbook chapters so that you can seek clarification where you require it. Look out for debate in the news media concerning legal and policy issues. Think about how psychological knowledge and research could inform this debate. In some cases the lecturer will identify specific reading but on other occasions you will be expected to use the library, research databases and other sources including the Internet to locate relevant material. The ability to locate relevant materials is a valuable skill that will be practiced and developed during this course.

Formative topic revision quizzes are available for students that provide an opportunity to evaluate understanding of course material on a weekly basis. Timely completion of the weekly quizzes will assist students in gaining a proper understanding of each topic so that this knowledge can be built on in future content.

3.2 Expectations of Students

It is expected that students are aware of UNSW Assessment policy and understand how to apply for special consideration if they are unable to complete an assignment/exam due to illness and/or misadventure.

It is expected that students have read through the School of Psychology Student Guide.

Tutorial/laboratory class participation is compulsory to ensure students are consistently working towards achieving the foundational graduate competencies required by the APAC Accreditation Standards. These Accreditation Standards are incorporated in Program and Course Learning Outcomes. Students must attend the assigned class and participation is monitored. Explanations for an occasional absence from a class should be discussed with the lecturer/tutor, and where applicable, accompanied by a medical certificate.

All news updates and announcements will be made on the 'Announcements' forum on the Moodle page and/or by email. It is the student's responsibility to check Moodle and their UNSW email accounts regularly to keep up to date.

The final exam for this course will occur during the UNSW examinations period. Students should not arrange travel during the UNSW exam period until the date of the final exam has been released. Students who arrange travel prior to the release of the final exam date will not be granted consideration in the event they are scheduled to be out of country when the final exam is to occur. In addition there will be an online midterm exam which will occur in one of the lecture slots in week 7. Students must ensure they are available to take this exam.

Students registered with Disability Support Services must contact the course co-ordinator immediately if they intend to request any special arrangements for later in the course, or if any special arrangements need to be made regarding access to the course material. Letters of support must be emailed to the course coordinator as soon as they are made available.

4. Course Schedule and Structure

Each week this course typically consists of 2 hours of lecture material, 2 hours of tutorials, and 1 hours of online modules. Students are expected to take an additional 5-7 hours each week of self-determined study to complete assessments, readings, and exam preparation. (Initials indicate the lecturer).

5. Assessment

5.1 Assessment Tasks

All assessments in this course have been designed and implemented in accordance with UNSW Assessment Policy.

Examinations: There will be two examinations – a mid-term exam and a final exam.

The final exam for this course will be an invigilated exam held on UNSW's Kensington campus. The exam will be conducted on Inspira, an online assessment platform. A requirement for this exam is that you come to your exam with a fully charged laptop.

If you are completing this course online as a remote student the UNSW Exams Team will contact you to arrange an online invigilated exam monitored by UNSW staff, via Zoom. You will need a working camera and microphone on your laptop and will be required to have your camera on for the entire duration of the exam.

The midterm exam will be held online.

The final exam will not be cumulative – that is **the topics covered before the mid-term exam will only be examined in the mid-term exam**, and **the final exam will only assess topics covered after the midterm exam**. Assessed material includes the contents of the lectures, the related textbook chapters or any other assigned readings, and the material from related lab classes. The Mid-Term exam will be 1 hour in duration and the Final Exam will be 2 hours in duration. The mid-term exam will take place during week 7.

Both the Mid-Term and Final Exams consist of written-answer and MCQ questions. The short-answer questions assess students' understanding of the topics covered. The extended answer question will assess students' ability to critically evaluate scientific evidence and to construct coherent, logical arguments using that evidence. Although past students have told us that they prefer to have a mid-term exam, there is a tendency to under-perform in the mid-term exam relative to the final exam. We strongly advise you to treat the mid-term exam as you would a final exam and allow sufficient time to study for the exam.

Assessment 2: Psycho-Legal Report. Each student must submit an original report of **no more than 1800 words** in length prepared in accordance with the APA Publication Manual (6th or 7th edition). The report should summarise and evaluate psychological research relevant to the specified issue or problem set in a form that would be useful to a particular target audience of researchers, policy makers or practitioners working within this field. A choice of three topic areas and target audiences will be provided. The report must not exceed 1800 words (including all text other than the reference

section and any appendices). Reports over this length may be penalised. Students must include an accurate word count at the end of the main body of their report. The assessment criteria for this assessment will be provided along with the topics. Students must read the assessment criteria and accompanying guidance before preparing the report as a particular format of report may be required. Reports must be submitted on Turnitin on the Moodle site by the due date indicated above.

Assessment 3: Media Presentation. Students will work in groups of about 4 (as assigned) to prepare and deliver a 25 minute presentation during one of the lab classes (with 5 additional minutes afterwards for discussion). **During the first two weeks of the course you will be assigned to a group and told which week you will present.** All members of the group will be required to contribute to the presentation. Your mark will be made up of two components – a group component which will be the same for all group members (75% of your mark) and an individual component (25%) based on your individual performance during the presentation.

The presentation will be based on a current Australian psycho-legal issue reported in the Australian media during the preceding two weeks. Students will present their report during one of the lab classes (as assigned by the tutor) and will lead a short discussion of the topic and its implications for psychological research and practice and the development of policy. Students are required to prepare three questions to help stimulate discussion. **A copy of the presentation must sent to the tutor immediately before the presentation.** Students should append a copy of the media article to their presentation.

This assignment will encourage students to think widely about psycho-legal issues and help form a better understanding of the ways in which psychological knowledge and research can be applied to legal and policy questions. The presentations will be marked against a set of clearly defined criteria that will be provided on the Moodle site. The presentation will contribute 20% of the final mark for the course. The assessment criteria used to assess the presentations, some tips for making good presentations and the rules about failure to present due to illness, will be made available via the Moodle site.

1. Your presentation must take a maximum of 25 minutes (excluding questions). Students may be penalised for presentations which significantly deviate from this duration.
2. This is a group assignment. Students will be assigned to groups of four members and must deliver a group assignment and presentation.

Students must give their presentation on the date assigned by their tutor. Failure to do so will result in a fail for this assignment and a mark of zero. **No alternative date will be offered.** If you do not present on the assigned date the other members of your group will proceed with the presentation and you will receive a mark of zero. If no one presents all members of the group will receive a mark of zero. The only exception to this relates to periods of illness of 3 days or more covered by medical certificates. **Please note if you are unable to present on the day assigned due to documented medical reasons (and your group proceeds with the presentation), you will be required to complete another presentation on a different topic on a date assigned by your tutor.** See the documentation on the Moodle site for further details regarding illness and the Media Presentation.

5.2 Assessment Criteria and Standards

Further details and marking criteria for each assessment will be provided to students closer to the assessment release date.

5.3 Submission of Assessment Tasks

Written assessments: In accordance with UNSW Assessment Policy written pieces of assessment must be submitted online via Turnitin on the course Moodle site. No paper or emailed copies will be accepted. All written assessments, including exam answers will be analysed by Turnitin to check for plagiarism.

Late penalties: Note there has been a change to the policy on penalties for late submission. It is critical that you read the details of the new policy in the 2022 T2 Psychology Student Guide on the Moodle page.

In accordance with the UNSW Assessment Implementation Procedure, failure to meet the submission deadline ("the initial deadline") will attract a penalty. Unless an extended deadline has been granted, if an assignment is submitted late, but within five days (120 hours) of the initial deadline, 5% of the maximum possible mark for that assignment will be deducted for each day (including weekend days) it is overdue. For example, if an assignment is worth 100 marks, you will automatically lose five marks ($100 \times 0.05 = 5$) for each day it is late. If you submit the assignment three days after the initial deadline, a penalty of 15 marks will be deducted.

Students can submit an assessment late, incurring the late penalty, until the "overdue submission deadline". The overdue submission deadline is five days (120 hours) after the initial deadline. Any assessment submitted after the overdue submission deadline will not be marked and will result in a mark of zero for the assessment. In determining whether an assignment is overdue, the date it was submitted online via Moodle will be used. Assignments submitted late may not receive detailed feedback from markers. Students are expected to manage their time to meet deadlines and to request extensions as early as possible before the deadline.

Request to Waive Late Penalty via Special Consideration: If circumstances outside a student's control have impacted their ability to submit an assessment before the initial deadline, they may apply to have the late penalty waived, via Special Consideration through The Nucleus: Student Hub (see "Special Consideration" below for details). If Special Consideration is granted, an extension up to a maximum of 10 working days past the initial deadline may be provided.

Under these circumstances an "absolute fail deadline" applies. Under no circumstances will an extension be given beyond when marks and feedback on the assessment are provided to students (10 working days from the initial deadline). Neglecting to submit an assignment by the absolute fail deadline will result in a mark of 0 for the assignment.

Request to Waive Late Penalty via Equitable Learning Plan: If a student is registered with UNSW Equitable Learning Services (ELS), and an Equitable Learning Plan (ELP) authorises extensions for assignment submission, you do not need to apply for Special Consideration irrespective of the weight of the assignment. Instead, **you are required to email the Course Convenor at least one week prior to the assessment deadline to request an extension**—unless the ELP specifically stipulates that you are not required to do so. If you do not follow the requirements indicated in your ELP, you may not be granted any adjustments. If your ELP does not include an authorisation for late submission, the same rules that apply to other students will apply to you (see "Special Consideration" below).

Under these circumstances an absolute fail deadline applies. Under no circumstances will an extension be given beyond when marks and feedback on the assessment is provided to students (10 working days from the initial deadline). Neglecting to submit an assignment by the absolute fail deadline will result in a mark of 0 for the assignment, unless Special Consideration has been granted to undertake a supplementary assessment (see "Special Consideration" and "Supplementary Assessment" below). Note that the form of supplementary assessment may not be identical to the original assessment but will assess the same learning outcomes. Moreover, the timing and conditions

of the supplementary assessment may differ from the standard assessment and will be determined by the Course Convenor, or by the Director of Undergraduate Programs. If a supplementary assessment is granted an extension up to a maximum of 10 working days past the absolute fail deadline may be provided. No further extensions beyond this point will be granted. In summary under the new policy unless an extended deadline has been granted, if an assignment is submitted late, but within five days (120 hours) of the initial deadline, 5% of the maximum possible mark for that assignment will be deducted for each day (including weekend days) it is overdue. The overdue submission deadline is five days (120 hours) after the initial deadline. Any assessment submitted after the overdue submission deadline will not be marked and will result in a mark of zero for the assessment.

Special Consideration: If you find that unexpected short-term illness, misadventure, or other circumstances beyond your control may prevent you from completing a course requirement or attending classes, or may significantly affect your performance in assessable work, you can apply for Special Consideration. Students enrolled in a School of Psychology course should make a Special Consideration application relating to an assessment task regardless of the weighting given to this assessment task. Except in unusual circumstances, the duration of circumstances impacting academic work must be more than 3 consecutive days, or a total of 5 days within the teaching period. Students should also note that UNSW has a Fit to Sit/Submit rule for all assessments - see Section 1.3 of the UNSW Application and Assessment Information document. If a student wishes to apply for special consideration for an exam or assessment, the application must be submitted prior to the start of the exam or before an assessment is submitted. If a student sits the exam/submits an assignment, they are declaring themselves well enough to do so and are unable to subsequently apply for special consideration (unless it is clear that the student was unfit to make reasonable judgement on their fitness to undertake the assessment due to mental illness or other extenuating circumstances). If a student becomes ill on the day of the exam, they must provide evidence dated within 24 hours of the exam, with their application. Fit to sit means that students should not attend an exam if they are feeling unwell and therefore must ensure that they are available to sit the supplementary exam during the supplementary exam period (as noted above, a supplementary exam opportunity for each Psychology course will be offered only once). Special consideration applications must be submitted to the online portal along with Third Party supporting documentation. Failure to do so will result in your application being rejected. Only circumstances deemed to be outside of the student's control, such as significant illness or misadventure during the assessment period, are eligible for special consideration. If the special consideration application is approved, students may be given an extended due date for the same piece of assessment, an aggregate mark may be calculated based on performance in other comparable assessments, or an alternative assessment/supplementary examination may be set, at the discretion of the course authority.
